Characters + Inspiration

Steven O'Reilly

Enthusiastic without being childish. Welcoming without being insincere. Steven is the poster child for Christmas spirit. He may not always think things through, but his heart's in the right place.

Emily Yeoh

In the process of finding herself professionally and spiritually, Emily is a mix of curiosity and confidence. As an atheist she brings a much needed critical, yet open, eye to help balance the group.

Alan Schwartz

Being Jewish, Alan is free (and excited) to hang out with his friends on Christmas Eve. He's sharp and quick to crack jokes, but under all that he's an incredibly caring and compassionate person.

Miriam Webster

The only thing predictable about Miriam is that she's unpredictable. She knows what she wants, she's empowered and she doesn't take guff from anyone. In short, Miriam is awesome.

Tone & Style

At the end of the day, this is a Christmas movie and we want to make sure we capture that. Bright, crisp lights will bring the actors to life. Backgrounds will be soft and warm. Scenes will use polished and precise camera movements.

This movie will feel visually familiar to other holiday films and share the same cinematic language.

Musically it will tap into holiday songs, but they'll be arranged in new ways to add humor and interest to the soundscape.

The performances will be a little exaggerated to drive home the comedy, but still grounded so the touching moments hit the right notes.













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Franchise Potential

One of the nice things about **A Ho Ho Horrible Christmas** are the plentiful opportunities to continue the adventures of Steven and his friends. Maintaining the style and tone, new entries can further explore holiday mythology, introduce new heroes and villains, and create a universe of connected stories and characters.

- 01. A Ho Ho Horribler Christmas: One year has passed. The elves has prepared for war. The council of St. Nicks is ready for payback. However, the four will find in unlikely ally to save them: Krampus.
- 02. A Ho Ho Horrible Hanukkah: It's up to fire up the menorah as Alan takes center stage to create another holiday miracle with the help of his friends.
- 03. **A Ho Ho Horrible Halloween**: On the night of the year the dead are given permission to return, the four must face off against an evil deity with more tricks than treats up his sleeve—Samhain.
